Dr. Harry C. Munro, writing in the SABBATH RECORDER emphasized the need for "every Sunday School teacher to be an evangelist."

And these tributary decisions should never obscure but should ever illumine the supreme verdict for Christ and His cause, which is the Christian teacher's perennial lode-star. This climaxes Christian teachers just as Christian teaching climaxes all teaching."
