## BAPTIST HOUR SPEAKER FOR SUMMER MONTHS

Dr. Forrest C. Feezor, Pastor of the First Baptist Church, Waco, Texas, will be the Baptist Hour speaker during the summer months of July, August and September. A long-time pastor and experienced radio speaker, Dr. Feezor will continue the evangelistic emphasis of these programs.

A graduate of Wake Forest College and Southern Baptist Theological Seminary, Dr. Feezor toured Europe and the Holy Land immediately following his student days. From 1923 to 1926 he taught Bible at William Jewell College, Liberty, Missouri, and was pastor of the First Baptist Church in Liberty from 1926 until 1931.

He returned to North Carolina in 1932, and served as pastor of the Tabernacle Baptist Church in Raleigh until 1943. The membership of that church more than doubled in that period of time, and Dr. Feezor was elected president of the North Carolina Baptist Convention in 1943.

In that same year he accepted the call to be pastor of the Broadway Baptist Church, Fort Worth, Texas. He moved to Waco in 1946. The Waco Church has grown marvelously under his leadership. He is an outstanding administrator, organizer, teacher, preacher and evangelist.
