CHURCH MEMBERSHIP GROWTH REPORTED

The annual review of church statistics made by the Christian Herald shows that membership in the churches of the United States continues to increase at a more rapid rate than the population. This report is compiled from figures presented by the statisticians of the denominations. It shows that in the past decade the percentage of population holding membership has increased from 45 to 54.2 and that the gain has been continuing since 1880, when only one in five Americans was listed as belonging to a church. The survey reveals that in the past year Protestants gains were 1,368,367 members, almost 2.9 per cent, compared with a Roman Catholic gain of about 2 per cent. Protestants make up about 59 per cent of the total, Roman Catholics 33 per cent, Jews 6 per cent and all others about 2 per cent. "The Roman Catholic Church," says the Christian Herald, "includes in its membership figures of all baptized persons, from infants up.

If all Protestant groups followed the Catholic system of counting, they would add at least 10 million to their currently reported membership. Or if the Roman Catholic Church followed the prevailing Protestant method, they would deduct about 6 million from theirs. The report shows that the top 12 Protestant denominations account for 77 per cent of the total, and that the Southern Baptists "are probably the fastest-growing of all the larger bodies."
