SUNDAY, 7:30 P.M.

The Golden Gate Baptist Theological Seminary male quartet will present a program of sacred music in the 7:30 worship service on Sunday evening. This quartet is composed of four theological students:

First Tenor—Durrill Davison, from Oklahoma, graduate of Baylor University.

Second Tenor—Sheldon Russell, from Minnesota, graduate of Wayland College.

Baritone—Ralph Rummage, from Oklahoma, graduate of Baylor University.

Bass—John Jacobs, from Ohio, graduate of Mississippi College.

They are ordained ministers, having pastorates in California, and are studying for the Bachelor of Divinity degree at Golden Gate Seminary in Berkeley, California. This school is one of the five national seminaries owned and operated by the Southern Baptist Convention.

The quartet will be accompanied by Wilbur F. Martin, Professor of Sacred Music at Golden Gate. Professor Martin served as organist for the Southern Baptist Convention in Miami, May 14-16. James H. Walker, Assistant Professor of Music will also be with the group to sing and assist Professor Martin.

This group will travel 10,000 miles between the dates May 3 and May 25, singing at colleges and churches. This quartet will concentrate on a repertoire of hymns. Music critics have acclaimed this quartet to be very fine and to have excellent blending qualities. During the Southern Baptist Convention this group appeared on radio and television in Miami.

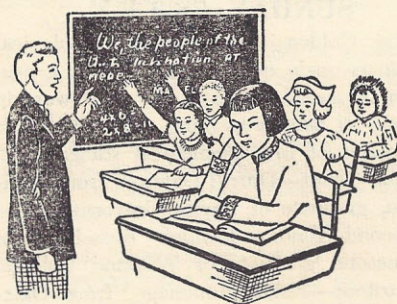

BOOKS SOUGHT FOR MIGRANT CHILDREN

On May 25th "every bus stop will be a book stop for migrant children." Thousands of migrant children who get their schooling on a catch-as-catch-can basis, as they travel the highways with their parents, who harvest the nation's crops, are going to receive a helping hand on Sunday, May 25th. Wide publicity is being given to this special collection by Jack Berch, on his own radio broadcasts, with the cooperation of the American Broadcasting Company. The American Transit Association has asked the full cooperation of its bus lines and operators in cities throughout Florida and Georgia. Just leave your books with the bus driver. There is a special need for children's books for both the pre-school and teen-aged child, particularly color books, Bible stories, dictionaries and classics such as *Tom Sawyer*, *Treasure Island* and others. These children have little opportunity for formal schooling because their parents stay such a short time in one place. Gather up your books and give generously.

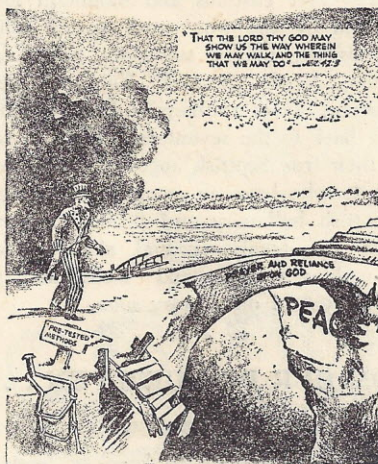
