A Statement About THE REVISED STANDARD VERSION OF THE BIBLE

The Sunday School Board plans to continue the use of the King James Version as the basic text in all its publications. The blessing of God has been upon this Version, so that it has brought light and life, faith and consolation, direction and inspiration and strength, to countless millions of people.

No one need have any uneasiness about the fidelity of the Sunday School Board to the Bible and to the faith and conviction of our Baptist people.

We need to understand, however, that the King James Version is only a translation of God's Word. The Scriptures, inspired by the Holy Spirit, were first written in Hebrew and Greek by holy men of God in the long ago. Had the Scriptures not been translated, most of us would not be able to read them. It is surely God's will that His Word be translated into all languages and that it be translated into the common language of succeeding generations.

This makes it natural and proper that the Scriptures be translated into the living language of our day. The changes in the meaning of words since the time of the King James Version, the fact that some older manuscripts have been found, and the discoveries by archeologists which have thrown new light on the meanings of ancient languages—all make it possible for another version to be a great step in God's purpose to reveal himself through His Word.

The publication of the Revised Standard Version has been made possible after years of laborious and self-sacrifice on the part of godly and scholarly students of the Bible. Many questions are arising, but we are confident that the translators will give

TITHING

I make no apology for lifting the scriptural standard of giving to Christian people, "for I seek not yours but you." In my experience as pastor, I have never known a Christian who read his Bible regularly, prayed daily, attended church faithfully, and tithed his income who was unhappy. Take that statement for what it is worth and you check up on it from your own observation.

With the Bible in her hand the church indicates the portion of your income that you should contribute:

"The tithe is the Lord's."
