THE SURVEY BULLETIN

More than 75,000 people attended the closing meeting of the Billy Graham revival at Dallas June 28. The Cotton Bowl was filled to capacity and thousands were turned away from perhaps the largest religious gathering in American history. During the revival, Graham joined the First Baptist Church of Dallas. He lives in Montreat, North Carolina, where there is no Baptist church.

More than 6,000 Sunday School workers attended the three Sunday School weeks at Ridgecrest, for a record attendance.

The American Baptist Convention (Northern Baptists) has appointed Senator Frank Carlson of Kansas to be general chairman of a campaign to raise \$8,250,000 for the building of 300 new American Baptist churches.

Alfred Carpenter, Director of Chaplains Commission of the Home Mission Board recently concluded a revival at the Sampson Air Base, New York, during a week's Simultaneous Preaching Mission. There were 1,322 men who made decisions for Christ.

The United States Department of Commerce has reported that Americans spent nearly one billion dollars in foreign travel in 1952. France, Italy, and Britain obtained the major share of United States travel, while Mexico obtained 180 million dollars.

The National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis is expecting 1953 to be the worst year in history. They report that new cases are running 30 per cent ahead of last year.

The Army's new and final account of its World War II battle casualties totals 936,259 Army and Air Corps personnel, including 234,874 deaths. The Navy has reported 36,950 deaths, and the Marines 19,733. These final totals number 5,900 more dead than the original account.
