Viewpoint

Freedom—Some people seem to feel that Baptist insistence on the separation of Church and State is just so much fanatic gourd rattling. In Colombia, South America, a presidential order makes Protestant activity outside the temples of worship illegal. According to Missionary Gerald Riddell, "All press work and radio programs are barred. Visitation, tract distribution, street services, and mission Sunday Schools are prohibited. Hospital and jail visitation are outlawed. Educational work except on a very small scale, is legally impossible."

Last September 3 "a memo was directed to all governors that the presence and activity of pastors or missionaries in certain regions denominated as exclusive Catholic territories by a treaty signed between Colombia's government and the Vatican was prohibited. These territories make up nearly three-fourths of Colombia's geographical extension."

We believe that all men ought to be free to worship God as they choose without interference from the State. No church ought to receive special favor from the State.

Speaking—As of last Monday, March 1, I have been your pastor for 60 days. In checking up I discover that I have brought 60 messages in that time, an average of one a day. If by "much speaking" a church can honor the Lord, we're well on the way. It looks as if Pensacola has about the most patient listeners to be found anywhere.

Expensive Door—The following lines tell their own story: "One day a man was measuring the door of a saloon with a yardstick.

"Facing the crowd who gathered around him, he said: 'That door is only two yards high, and one yard wide, still my house went through that door. I had a farm; it went through that door also. I had horses and cows, they went through it. I was strong and healthy, but lost both through that door. While I was young, I had reputation; today, nobody trusts me—they say, 'He is a drunkard.' I lost my honor through that door'."

A television workshop, co-sponsored by the Radio Commission of the Southern Baptist Convention and Central Baptist Church, Pensacola, will be conducted in Pensacola March 8, according to Paul M. Stevens, director of the Commission.

T. M. Johns, superintendent, Florida Baptist Children's Home, was elected president of the Child Care Executives in their annual meeting in San Antonio recently. The group reported that 5,000 children are cared for in the 22 denomination's orphanages and children's homes.

Wayne Evans, educational director, First Baptist Church, Abilene, Texas, has been named business manager of the Southwestern Seminary, Fort Worth. He succeeds D. A. Thornton, who died November 29.

Facts of Interest—To commemorate the 75th anniversary of Thomas A. Edison's invention of the incandescent bulb, a 75,000-watt successor, said to be the world's largest, was lighted at Rockefeller Center, Feb. 11.

The atom is already at work in every-day peacetime uses. More than 1,000 industrial firms now employ the atom in every-day factory operations; while in hospitals and clinics, atomic medicines are being administered on a growing scale. It is estimated that more lives have already been saved by the atom than were wiped out in the Hiroshima and Nagasaki A-bomb blasts.

In the World of Religion—There are now 89,000 Scout units in this country with 2,500,000 members, a third of which are sponsored by Protestant churches. Eighteen hundred Protestant church-sponsored troops and cub packs were added last year.

As of December 1, 1953, the Gideons have distributed more than 26 million Bibles and Testaments throughout the world. Almost 25 million were distributed in the U. S. A.

The Red Cross, with 3,700 chapter across the country, has reported expenditures of \$86,041,583 in 1953, of which \$35,147,000 were spent on services for veterans and men in uniform. 232,200 service men and 133,000 families were aided. They used 1,650,000 volunteers to help administer their program.
