MANNER FOR ELECTING DEACONS

Our church has thirty Deacons who are elected for staggered terms of three years each so that the terms of ten members expire each year. Under our present procedure these ten, as well as any inactive Deacons who were ordained by our church, except those who ask to be omitted, are automatically placed in nomination for the ten vacancies. In addition, a nominating committee, after careful consideration, recommends several additional nominees from the active laymen who have not previously served as Deacons in our church.

At one time our policy was to make the Deacons whose three year terms were expiring ineligible for re-election as active Deacons for a period of one year. This policy was abandoned during World War II because of reduced "manpower." From time to time the Deacons and other members of the church have considered whether we should return to this former plan of compulsory retirement.

The Deacons have decided to seek the will of the church on this question without a recommendation from the Board as to either plan, but with a summary of some of the points that have been made in favor of each. Of course, the preference of a majority will control in this as in all other church matters.

POINTS IN FAVOR OF PRESENT PLAN

- (1) The church should not be deprived of the services of a Deacon merely because he has served three years.
- (2) New members, recommended by a nominating committee, and also inactive Deacons who were ordained by our

church, can be elected by the church membership in lieu of one or more Deacons whose terms are expiring. This itself brings about some rotation in the office.

- (3) Experience has shown that "new blood" is customarily added to the Deacons each year.
- (4) Usually one or more of the Deacons whose terms are expiring request that their names be omitted from the ballot, thereby voluntarily creating vacancies.

POINTS IN FAVOR OF COMPULSORY RETIREMENT PLAN

- (1) There is much greater likelihood of electing new members to the Deacons under this plan, especially younger men as well as other outstanding laymen who have joined our church in recent years.
- (2) This plan enables the church to retire "lukewarm" Deacons without shock and disappointment to them, to their families and to their friends.
- (3) A Deacon, during his compulsory one year "vacation" will have the opportunity to study the office from a new angle. If he is later returned to the Deacons, he brings a new vigor and a broader conception of his duty.
- (4) No man is indispensable, and a retiring Deacon, as a consecrated Christian Deacon, will serve his church regardless of whether he remains active, which will certainly result in his re-election later.

(The election will be held on Sunday, June 6).
