## DO YOU WANT TO BE A DEACON?

A splendid young woman said to me: "Someday I'd like for my husband to be a deacon." Well, the highest honor a layman can ever receive is to be elected as a deacon by his church. But, a man must pay a price for this honor. There are certain requirements which he must meet. For the benefit of our young men who aspire to this high office, I am giving you these requirements:

1. He should measure up to the requirements given in I Timothy 3:8-13.
2. He should live a consecrated Christian life, bringing no reproach by his conduct upon the Church or the cause of Christ.
3. He should attend Church every Sunday morning and Sunday night, every Wednesday night, and all special Church meetings, unless hindered by some reason which is approved by a good conscience.
4. He should be a tither—bringing his tithe systematically to the Church for the Lord's work.
5. He should be evangelistic and missionary in spirit, deeply interested in the salvation of souls at home and abroad.
6. He should be fully cooperative with the pastor and Church in a great spiritual program of advancement.
7. He should be a man who refrains from destructive criticism of his pastor and Church, willing to settle all difficulties in a quiet and Christian manner, without hurting the cause of Christ and His Church.
8. He should be able to keep in secrecy those things which should not be discussed with others.
10. He should be a man about whom people say, "He is a good Christian man."

Chester Swor is to be with us in January, 1956. Tentative arrangements have been made to have Dr. Duke McCall in 1957. Because of another date that has not yet been settled for him, Dr. McCall at present is reserving the right to cancel this proposed engagement with us if there is a conflict. We rejoice in the prospect of the coming of these men. Let's not wait upon them to be busy witnessing to the lost, however.

Our architect has informed us, through Brother York Colson, who has recently been to Birmingham and gone over the work being done for us, that our plans are scheduled to be put in the mail on Monday, August 23. I must confess that I was a little disappointed that they had not arrived when I returned from vacation. If the architect is able to meet the deadline he has set, we will be ready to submit the plans to contractors for bids within a few short weeks.

I am making no more tentative predictions about "Ground-Breaking" until those plans are in hand. It looks like the time is almost upon us, however.

# SHOULD WE MAKE THEM COME?

"I let my boy decide for himself, on religious questions," said the father. "I was forced to go to church when I was a boy, and I didn't like it, so my son is going to make up his own mind about religion, when he wants to. Real freedom!"

"Let's see if that's true," I replied. "You say you let your boy make up his own mind. Do you mean that if he decided to join a gang of young thieves you wouldn't raise a hand to hinder him?"

"Certainly I'd stop him," snapped the father. "Stealing is against the law; I don't want a law-breaker in my family."

"Yes," I replied, "stealing is against human law, and also against divine law, which, in the Eighth Commandment says, 'Thou shalt not steal.' You would discourage your son from breaking the Eighth Commandment. But you will not try to keep him from breaking the First Commandment, which says, 'Thou shalt have no other gods before me,' or the Fourth, which says, 'Remember the Sabbath Day to keep it holy.'"

"I hadn't thought of it in that way," said the father, surprised. "Really, I ought to encourage my son to keep the Fourth Commandment just as much as the Eighth, shouldn't I?"

"Yes," I went on, "in the long run your son will have to choose whether or not he will be a thief, an idolater, a sabbath breaker. But you ought to give him all the encouragement you can to help him choose the right rather than the wrong—are you in Training Union yourself, Mister?"

"Well, no, that's just for children, isn't it?"

"Not at all. We have departments in the Training Union, as in the Sunday School, for every age group. You need to be in both for one is the laboratory, the other the lecture period, of Christian education."

"All right, I'll try it Sunday night. And say—I'm going to bring my boy and stay for the evening preaching service, too!"—Jimmy McClendon.
