My trip to Nashville was for the purpose of conferring with Sunday School Board folks about these writing assignments.

Writing—I enjoy trying to use my pen for the Lord whenever I can find time to attempt to write. Some of you noticed the article in the Adult section of **The Builder**, January, 1955. Three programs will appear in the June, 1955, **Baptist Adult Union Quarterly**. 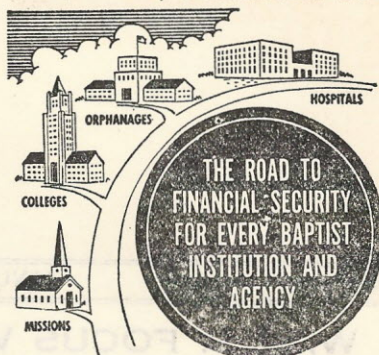

THE NEXT SEMESTER OF THE SEMINARY EXTENSION CENTER

Begins at the Brownsville Baptist Church on January 25, and Continues for 18 Weeks
The courses being offered are:

7:00 - 8:00 p.m.

1. New Testament 132—A study of the Epistles and Revelation. Rev. J. K. Knight, Jr., teacher.

2. Old Testament 111—A historical study of the first ten books of Old Testament (Adam to David). Rev. A. C. Abney, teacher.

3. Religious Education 125—A study of the organizations of a Baptist church with suggestions as to their place and functions. Rev. A. B. Allen, teacher.

8:00 - 9:00 p.m.

1. Theology (doctrine) 116—A study of the basic doctrines that Baptists believe. Rev. James K. Knight, Jr., teacher.

2. Church History 124—A study of the history of the churches from the time of organization until present time. Rev. E. S. Owens, teacher.

3. New Testament 112—A historical study of the life of Jesus and of the Christian church up to the time of the conversion of Saul of Tarsus. Rev. W. H. Peters, teacher.

There is also to be a class in Spoken English taught by Rev. Angus Neel.
