Community Activities worthy of your consideration at this time are: the Community Chest, the Employ the Physically Handicapped Week emphasis, and the Youth-Adult Institute at Blount Junior High School. Dr. Edwin R. Hartz, of Florida State University is leading conferences at Blount at 7:30 p.m. on Monday, Tuesday, Thursday, and Friday nights. Any adult in the community may attend.

If you know of physically handicapped people who need help in securing employment, please notify the church office. In turn, if you are in need of the skill and ability offered by some of these people, you will contact the local employment offices.

A Challenge. The church has adopted a 1956 budget of \$172,786. In addition to this, our Building Fund goal for the period October 1, 1955 - December 31, 1956, is \$100,000. This means that we are being called upon to pledge \$272,786 on October 23. Only a recognition of the Lordship of Jesus and a commitment to tithing as a minimum expression of Christian Stewardship will enable us to reach such a goal. This we can and want to do to the glory of God. Our building is going up; the Lord has been good; let us be faithful in our stewardship.

Victory Day Leadership—Dr. Gayle Batson has been elected by the church to lead our Every Member Canvass and Mr. Glenn McDonald has been elected to lead our Building Fund Canvass. Both efforts are being presented to the congregation simultaneously and pledges will be received for both on Victory Day, October 23.

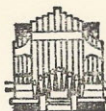
Larry Mayo wrote as follows in the bulletin of the First Baptist Church, Smithfield, North Carolina, September 15th:

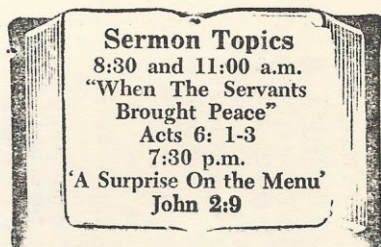

MY PLEDGE CARD SPEAKS

I HOLD in my hand a card; it is not very large and does not appear significant. On the basis of economic value it is not worth much, but to me this card is of great importance and I believe it is of significance to my Heavenly Father. Notice what this card has written upon it:

In recognition of God's ownership and of my stewardship, and constrained by the love of Christ, I purpose to contribute to the 1956 budget of my church the following amount per week: \$_____.

Soon I shall take great pleasure in turning this card in to my church as a token of my love and loyalty to Jesus Christ.

In my imagination I have often heard this card speak.

It speaks of my decision to do my part. I am but one member of my church and, while I cannot do much, I can do my part.

It speaks of my interest in the full program of my church. It indicates my love of these buildings and my desire that they be kept clean and attractive for study and worship and play. It speaks of my interest in the program of Bible study, worship, training, mission education and giving which is carried on week by week in my church. It speaks of my conviction that the only hope of lost men is the gospel of Jesus Christ.

It speaks of my concern for the World

Mission Program of my church. It speaks of schools, hospitals, mission churches, summer assemblies, a home for orphan children, an alert program of promotion, enlargement and evangelism in my own state. It speaks of colleges, seminaries, hospitals, publication houses, home missionaries, a radio and television ministry—all here in the Southland. It speaks of approximately 900 American men and women in the distant places of the earth, representing me as ambassadors of Christ. When I hold this card in my hand I seem to hear voices and see visions. I am in a little church in Rio, a mission station in Madrid, a school in Singapore, an orphanage in Rome, a seminary in Zurich, a hospital in Nigeria. For, as I give through my church, I support all of these and more!

It speaks of my investment in that which is eternal. So much that I do is transitory and passing. This card reminds me that what I give unto the Lord constitutes my eternal treasure.

It speaks of my love of Christ. At best, I am a poor Christian but I do love Him who first loved me and this card represents one of the best means I know of proving this love.

I have not mentioned the amount written on this card. When I think of my Saviour, I wish it were twenty times as large but at least it is a part of me and I rejoice in the privilege of "being laborers together with God."
