

DO NOT MISS the value of the poetry because you do not immediately appreciate the melody.

DO LISTEN CAREFULLY when the music is played on the organ. You may learn to like it.

DO REMEMBER that the hymns of our hymnbook have been selected by musicians and ministers of high repute in the field. Out of thousands of possibilities these have been thought most appropriate and worthy of the common worship of the church. It is not intelligent to dismiss lightly the selection of discriminating minds.

DO THANK GOD for the privilege of extending your cultural horizon in something new; that you are not confined to the limitation of your past experience; that the created hymnody of the church is so extensive. This is God's Word: "Oh, sing a NEW SONG unto the Lord."—Copied.

AFTER GAME FELLOWSHIP


For the next three Fridays there are home football games. After each game there will be an After-Game Fellowship at the church. U R INVITED.


