

DR. FRANK TRIPP TO PREACH SUNDAY




DR. FRANK TRIPP

Dr. Frank Tripp will preach at both services Sunday in the absence of Dr. Bolton who will be concluding Revival Services at the Riverside Baptist Church, Miami.

Dr. Tripp has served as pastor of some of our outstanding churches and has served in many places of leadership in our denomination. He was the originator and promoter of the Baptist Hundred Thousand Club which resulted in the payment of approximately \$7,000,-000 accumulated indebtedness on the agencies and institutions of the Southern Baptist Convention.

Since May 1, 1947, he has served as the Executive Secretary of the Hospital Board of the Southern Baptist Convention. This board operates hospitals in New Orleans and Jacksonville. He will retire from this position June 1, 1959.

"Poor music is like poor literature, bad manners, crudity, and baseness. On the other hand, good music lifts one, develops appreciation for the better things, creates a wholesome atmosphere, elevates cultural levels, and builds character. It builds the individual spiritually, satisfies him emotionally, and influences him to cleaner living and the development of better character.

ENLISTMENT PROPERLY APPROACHED demands that our church (or any church) take, at least, an annual census. We are in need of a fresh census since our last one was taken several years ago. Think of the hundreds of new folks who have moved into Pensacola since then.

NEIGHBORS — AND THAT IS WHAT WE ARE. We need your help if we as a church are to be true to our Lord's command as Christian people. It is our business to know who ought to be in the Sunday School and Training Union and the other organizations of our church.

Last week I received a call from the church office that a family of eight was cold and needed cover. I went to the attic and found three quilts that I had not used for sometime. Only 36 attended one or more of our programs during our Foreign Mission Week. We have 263 enrolled. Let's do better in March.

MASTERPIECES OF RELIGIOUS VERSE

This is the work of 25 years during which time Dr. Morrison read from year to year many thousands of poems, selecting and filing those he thought best. Immense reading and research have been employed. The editor and his assistants visited many libraries, including the Library of Congress, New York Public Library, the Parliamentary Library, Canada, Queen's University Library, hunting down scarce editions of books and periodicals, checking for accuracy the authorized versions. The editor estimated that, in many cases over 100 poems were rejected for the one selected.
