## MISSION MOTORCADE TO NEW ORLEANS

A tour of points of mission interest in New Orleans is being planned for Royal Ambassadors of the Association, March 27-28. The plan is to leave Pensacola about 4:00 A.M. Last Sunday 50 reading questionnaires were returned in Adult B Department, Mr. W. E. Jackson, Superintendent. Their reading habits and interests were revealed as follows:

98% are regular readers of newspapers.  
78% are regular readers of books.  
46% are regular readers of books.  
76% are regular readers of religious matter.

195 books had been read during the last 6 months or about 4 books for each.

312 hours were spent a week reading or about 6 hours each.

Fiction was preferred by 29, religious books by 22, Biography by 18, history by 18, missions by 12, philosophy by 8, travel by 8, literature by 7, science by 7. Other books suggested were books on humor, law, mystery, fiction, and technical books.

All 50 consider reading worthwhile. 42 feel reading is more beneficial than TV; 2 thought both were good.

10 said they did not think it necessary to keep the library open more hours. 3 suggested we should have it open Saturday morning and afternoon; 1 said we should keep it open 24 hours a day.

SUGGESTIONS for better use of the Library were as follows: (a) broader and better selection of books, (b) more attention to individual needs and desires, (c) emphasize reading to youth groups, (d) publish list of new additions in the Builder, (e) greater emphasis and publicity as to what is available, (f) take children to the Library during the Sunday School hour once every 6 weeks, (g) more books for the special requirements for R. A.'s and G. A.'s.

## BAPTIST HIGHLIGHTS

Southern Baptist church membership increased 240,503 (2.7 per cent) in 1958, and reached a total of 9,206,758, according to the Research and Statistics Department of the Baptist Sunday School Board, which has released the official denominational statistics for 1958. The 31,498 churches, a gain of 201 over 1957, reported 407,892 baptisms, 18,176 more than in 1957.

Two additional significant milestones were reached. Sunday school enrollment passed the seven-million milestone, with a total enrollment of 7,096,175, a gain of 123,825 (1.8 per cent) over 1957. Total gifts reached a new high of \$419,619,438. This compared with \$397,550,347 in 1957. Gifts to mission causes increased \$4,735,300 (6.8 per cent) to reach a new high of \$74,750,699. Per capita gifts were \$45.58, compared with \$44.34 in 1957.
