DR. JAMES A. STEWART SUNDAY'S PULPIT GUEST

Dr. Stewart is a native of Northern Ireland, and was educated in the University of London, the Baptist Theological College of Ireland, Eastern University, and New Orleans Baptist Theological Seminary.

He came to America in 1927; spent one year as Professor of Theology in the International College, Cristo, Cuba. From 1930 to 1955 he was in the pastorate serving churches in Oklahoma, Mississippi, Louisville, Kentucky, and Jacksonville, Florida. He resigned the pastorate of Riverside Baptist Church in Jacksonville in 1957 to become Dean of the Chapel and Professor of Philosophy at Stetson University.

Our Children

Your Child and Easter

Since Easter Sunday is only a week or so away, let each of us—parent and worker alike—take a new look at how we can better prepare these our children for the day.

The first step in helping little children know the true meaning of Easter is for us to demonstrate a loving faith in the living Christ.

The significance of Easter is diluted for many small children by the artificial manner in which it is observed. For example there are many parents who attend church only on Easter. This surely will not give the child a sense of importance to the day. Indeed, if Easter is the only time the child is taken to church, what will there be to distinguish "church on Easter" from going to the yearly fair or attending a Fourth of July picnic?

In addition to irresponsible church attendance, the matter of dress on Easter can quite easily affect the young child adversely. Many households are so hurried and tense the day before Easter with shopping details, frantic sewing, the trying on of new shoes or scratchy dresses that tempers run short, and feelings get hurt. In some homes they wear their new spring clothes at the first signs of spring. They explain to their children that as God's world takes on new dresses, so they too put away their winter clothes and don spring ones.

A third hazard to the Christian interpretation of Easter is the exaltation of the Easter Bunny. Some feel that the Easter Bunny should never be taught to children, or should not be represented as true. Others feel that children can get a lot of excitement of waiting for the Easter Bunny, hunting eggs, et cetera, without missing the true significance of Easter. Whatever view you hold, we would probably all agree that there is some danger that this mythical figure will usurp Christ's place in our children's thinking. Non-elaborate egg hunts can be great fun for all the family, but let us resist the temptation to buy expensive gifts or place so much emphasis on the Easter Bunny that the spiritual significance is lost.—Copied.

Sunday afternoon is the time for our monthly Executive Committee Meeting. The meeting is scheduled for 5:15 p.m. in the Adult A Department.

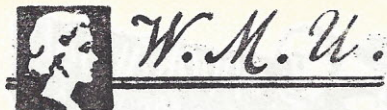
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LOST
