FORMER COMMUNIST TO SPEAK SUNDAY

Rev. Nikolai A. Alexandrenko will speak at both services in our church Sunday. Rev. Alexandrenko was born in Bryansk, Russia. He was an officer in the Russian paratroop corps, and was taken as a prisoner of war in Germany during the Second World War. He was liberated from prison camp by the American Army and refused to return to Communist Russia for political reasons. He was converted to the Christian Faith in Germany through reading Gospel leaflets, and came to the U. S. in 1951 to study for the Gospel ministry.

He graduated from Louisiana College with the B. A. degree; from Tulane University with an M. A. degree in the Classical Languages; and from the New Orleans Baptist Theological Seminary with the B. D. degree. He is now doing graduate work at the New Orleans Seminary toward the Doctor of Theology degree. He will join the faculty of Louisiana College in September as an Assistant Professor of Classical Languages and Religion.

In 1957 he became a citizen of the U. S. He married a Louisiana girl and they have two sons.

In addition to speaking at the 11:00 and 7:30 p.m. Services, he will speak to the young people's departments of the Training Union at 6:10 in the Adult A Department.

P. S.—Everybody is cordially invited to join the clique.

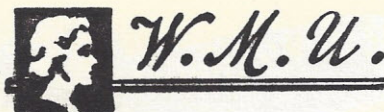

REVIVAL SUGGESTIONS

Rev. Felix Wagner, Muskogee, Oklahoma, made the following suggestions to his people concerning their participation in the Revival Services:

"New Life For You" is the theme of our evangelistic services. Now is the time for all of the members of our church to "clear" their calendar for April 26-May 3. Don't wait any longer or you will have difficulty in arranging to attend every service of the Revival meeting. Here are some concrete suggestions to help you get ready.

1. Make arrangements for someone else to take your responsibility in the P.T.A., Civic Club, lodge, club or any secular activity during those eight days. This can be done very simply—just as it would be if you would become ill or unable to keep that appointment.

2. Some of our people visit out of town over the week-ends occasionally. Plan these visits so that they will not fall on the dates of April 26-May 3. This also can be very simply arranged.

3. De not plan any Sunday School Class meeting or any other church function for your organization during the week of April 26-May 3. The April 26-May 3 schedule will be so full there won't even be time for a "brief" meeting of your organization.

4. Let your friends know (who usually have the distasteful habit of dropping in unannounced for the week-end) that you simply cannot give them any time during April 26-May 3. You can do this graciously and be a witness to them at the same time.

5. If you are planning an operation, and it is not an emergency, plan to have it at a time other than April 26-May 3. Any doctor will be glad to work with you for he
