

FACTS OF INTEREST

Americans spend about 15 per cent more for cigarettes and other tobacco products than they give to all churches and religious and charitable activities. According to the United States Department of Agriculture, expenditures for cigarettes and tobacco products in 1957 totaled \$4,262,000,000. The United States Chamber of Commerce has estimated that Americans gave \$3,746,000,000 to churches and religious and charitable organizations in 1956 (latest years figures are available on both items).

Figures just released by the Department of Commerce show that Americans spent \$10,700,000,000 for alcoholic liquors in 1957. This amounted to \$64.84 for every living person in the nation based on an estimated population of 165 million.


