

PASTOR'S PARAGRAPHS



Quoted below is a statement by Mr. Paul Blanshard from his book, "American Freedom and Catholic Power," which I hope will bring clarity to the muddled issues in connection with a Roman Catholic candidate in the presidential race. Some of us cringe at the sound of bigotry and intolerance. We might do well to cringe instead at an "easy tolerance" which threatens our freedom and American way of life. Here is the statement:

"The policy of mutual silence about religious differences is a reasonable policy in matters of personal faith; but when it comes to matters of political, medical, and educational principles, silence may be directly contrary to public welfare. When a church enters the arena of controversial social policy and attempts to control the judgment of its own people (and of other people) on foreign affairs, social hygiene, public education, and modern science it must be reckoned with as an organ of political and cultural power.

"When they come to apply tolerance to the world of religion, however, they often forget its affirmative implication and fall back on the negative cliche, 'you should never criticize another man's religion.' Now, that innocent sounding doctrine, born of the noblest sentiments, is full of danger to the democratic way of life. It ignores the duty of every good citizen to stand for the truth in every field of thought. It fails to take account of the fact that a large part of what men call religion is also politics, social

hygiene, and economics. Silence about another man's religion may mean acquiescence in second-rate medicine, inferior education, and anti-democratic government."

All of us have much for which to be thankful in America. Be in your place Sunday as we lift up our hearts in thanksgiving unto God for this blessed land of ours.

Due to the absence of Comdr. Sparks, there will be no Directors' Meeting for the next several weeks until further notice.


