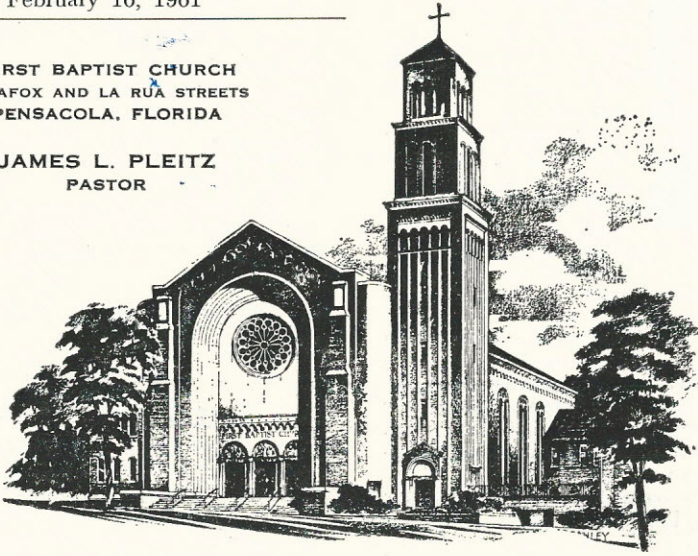

Reputation is a manufactured thing, rolled and plated and hammered and brazed and bolted; character is a growth.

Reputation comes over one from without; character grows from within.

Reputation is what you have when you come into a new community; character is what you have when you go away.

Your reputation is earned in an hour; your character does not come to light for a year.

Reputation is made in a moment; character is built in a lifetime.

A single newspaper report gives you your reputation; a life of toil gives you your character.

If you want to get a position, you need reputation; if you want to keep it, you need character.

Reputation makes you rich or makes you poor; character makes you happy or makes you miserable.

Reputation is what men say about you on your tombstone; character is what the angels say about you before the throne of God.

Reputation is the basis of the temporal judgment of men; character is the basis of the eternal judgment of God.

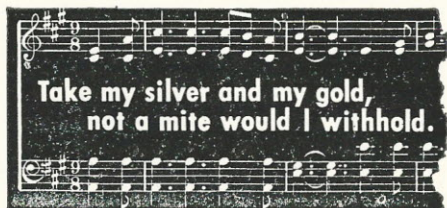
You say, "The church ought to do so-and-so." Who is the church? The pastor? Of course not! A special committee No.
