Have you wondered when and where the earliest church libraries existed? This interesting item is taken from Halley's Bible Handbook. In 2000 B. C., In Ur, Abraham's own city, in Lagash, Nippur, Sippar, indeed in every important city in Babylonia, in connection with the schools and temples, there were libraries with hundreds of thousands of books: dictionaries, grammars, reference works, encyclopedias, official annals, works on mathematics, astronomy, geography, religion and politics. It was a period of great literary activity, and there were produced many of the masterpieces which Assurbanipal, king of Assyria, had his scribes copy for his great library in Nineveh.

The name of the city of Sippar means "book town" which indicates it was famous for its libraries.

In 1900 when excavations were made in Nippur, there was found a library of 20,000 volumes; archives of kings; schools with large reference cylinders mounted on revolving stands, dictionaries, encyclopedias, complete works on law, science, religion and literature.

If you do not have a Halley's Bible Handbook of your own, come and get one in the library and read further on this subject as well as many other excellent, informing articles.
