Library Notes

"Without competing in any way with the evangelist whose work for God is so mightily needed, but rather to reinforce it, I plead for a reading revival. I plead for reading, not alone because of books and libraries, but as a way to that inner calm so necessary to national health. The very act of reading calls for some quiet and repose—necessary preludes to thought. I call for upping the national daily average of book reading from the present five minutes to at least fifteen. I promise the nation a revelation in reducing jitters and calming nerves.

One of the greatest sources of mental power in the United States is our libraries. In them is everything great and good man has ever thought or done. Our people need to be armed with good deeds and great thoughts of all times—the eternal verities.

The return to reading seeks to balance action with meditation, activity with thought, materialism with spirituality. Only in such a balance is there any future for all of us."

THE TRUE MINISTRY OF MUSIC

If, in a worship service, the choir sings an anthem or a solo is presented which seems to lift you from your pew, leaving your heart excited, a feeling of gladness welling inside, and the desire to "praise God from whom all blessings flow" seeking release, then be glad and allow yourself to praise this God, for it isn't by chance that this music was such to cause this reaction, nor is it by chance that the choir sang it that way.

For any composer to write anything capable of inspiring you, he first had to be inspired. It is this welling up inside him, this gladness, this desire to praise the Living God which has overflowed and has expressed itself in worthy music capable of reaching you. Moist eyes very often explain that the heart has worshipped; the soul has felt communication; fellowship with our Divine Redeemer has been ours.

But, we must understand that this ecstatic feeling has not come to us free of charge, for it has been born by pain by our Creator; nor may we enjoy it without cost, for when we come face to face with the Almighty, we suddenly become aware of the sin and injustice within us. This realization is the first step toward repentance and our restoration to a more perfect fellowship. If through beautiful music we can help this happen to you, then the ministry of music is beginning to minister.
