YOUTH WANT CHURCH-GOING MOMS AND DADS

The following article released recently by the Religious News Service should be of interest to every Adult.

"Parents can help raise the moral standards of the country by attending church with their children. This was the consensus of a cross-section of more than 12,000 teen-agers at the annual convention of the Arkansas Association of Future Homemakers here.

"If parents do not attend church with their children, the children feel the church is not important," the future homemakers agreed. "Parents who take their children to church, leave them there and then go home are not setting a good example."

Delegates made it plain they feel "the country's moral standards are dropping dangerously low."

"Parents and school teachers should not tell and teach us one thing and do something different," the youth declared. The future homemakers also said the youth of today have "great responsibility" for keeping moral standards up in the future.

THE *Singing* CHURCH

An Explanation

Some have indicated during the past several weeks that during the services they have felt the organ was being played too loudly. Let me say that we appreciate your concern and interest in the way things happen during the services. In order to help you understand, here are some factors which you might consider:

1. Our instrument (any pipe organ) cannot be manipulated like a radio, i.e. select any volume without affecting the tone quality.
2. This instrument includes more than you think. It is not merely an electric gadget imitating organ sounds through a small speaker system. This is the real thing! The whole sanctuary is a part of the instrument, not just the pipes and a console .
3. The organ sounds loudest when there are empty spaces in the seating area allowing more reverberation?
4. The organ sounds loudest when there is a lesser degree of congregational participation in the singing. This was noticed last Sunday when the same registration was used on two consecutive hymns. One was old and was sung well and did not seem to have offensive accompaniment; the other was also old but few knew it well enough to make an honest effort at singing it. Some returned their hymnbooks to the rack without even letting the words speak to their hearts. (Jesus, Lover Of My Soul). The organ then sounded loud and harsh.
5. Many mistake timbre for volume. This is the peculiar quality of a particular rank of pipes and because of necessary adjustment made during the modification of the instrument for this sanctuary, some of the pipes took on a piercing quality. It became more harsh and less pleasant to the ear. It is very difficult not to use some of these pipes.
6. Some have been accustomed to the "skating rink variety" of organ music; to the accordian and other types of reedy sounds and have never developed an appreciation for "the King of instruments."
7. Ours is still a pretty good, old instrument having been moved and operated on countless times and having some components still doing their best since about 1896. We are proud to have it. We look forward to the day when she
