The sentinel of prayer.

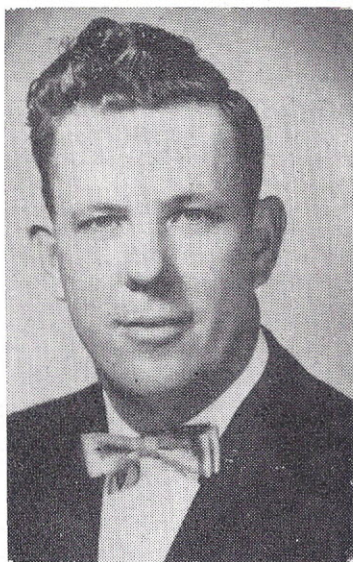
So shall God's grace your steps attend,

Did you know we keep an individual reading record in our Library? Every Tuesday several ladies record all the books which have been checked out the previous week. We now have an 8-year record and as we looked through it we found it interesting, revealing and encouraging.

For instance, we are proud of Johnny Laöner, 11 next month, who started his record in March '56. It now shows he has checked out 436 books. He is an excellent, fast reader now in the 5th grade, but is reading some books on senior high level.

Then we are especially proud of a family record, that of Mr. and Mrs. Julian Wilson, Debbie 8, and David 5, who have a total of 783 books to their credit. Debbie started checking out books in Aug. '56 when she was 2 and her total is 411. She will enter third grade this fall, but is already reading from the 9-12 Junior book section. Little David in his three year record since May '59 has 266 books to his credit. His love for books and reading is a splendid preparation for entering school this fall. The parents have set a good example by reading 106 books themselves.

We appreciate seeing young mothers bringing their little ones early. One mother said, "She won't go to her class until she has been to the library to get a book." Another little two year old comes regularly and says, "I want my Li-Ba-ry" book."

"Train up your child in the way he should go (to love books and reading) and when he is old he will not depart from it." Help your children get a good start in reading—"life's greatest pleasure" as Archibald Rutledge states it in his book by that title.

WORTH READING

In the July issue of the Christian Herald listed side by side are views entitled "The Ideal Layman" and "The Ideal Minister." Outstanding minister Ralph W. Sockman wrote the ideal layman, while an esteemed layman, Mr. Jenkin Lloyd Jones, wrote about the ideal minister. A few excerpts from each will prove interesting.

Dr. Sockman said: "The ideal layman must see his work as a divine vocation . . . The true layman, therefore, is a member of the church plus a minister of the church . . . He witnesses for his Lord in his office, his shop, his home, translating into daily life the inspiration and ideas gained in worship. . . .

"Consider some other plus factors in the personality of a good layman. He is a student plus a servant. He comes to the church not merely to get a shot in the arm, but also some ideas in his head. . . . His mind is open. . . . He respects others. . . . He wants to hear the Word . . . He believes with Thomas Carlyle that if we do the duty next to us and then the duty next to that, the light begins to break upon the ultimate duty.

"The ideal layman is a loyal parishioner plus a world citizen. . . . Moreover, the good layman is a gentleman plus a Christian. He realizes that it takes Christ-like imagination and insight to practice the Golden Rule."

Mr. Jones' conception of an ideal minister is one who imparts spiritual food to his hearers. He said: "What do we mean by spiritual food? What else is this but preaching and teaching that makes living more meaningful? . . . This means not only comfort in time of affliction, but courage in time of doubt, confidence in the face of confusion and danger. . . .

"All of this requires soul-searching. . . . Christians want assurances that the Christian approach is the answer, that man, faced for the first time with possible annihilation, can find in Christian fortitude the strength to stay free and the wisdom to stay alive.

"This is the assurance that the perfect Protestant preacher of the mid-twentieth century will deliver to his congregation. He will be rare, but he will be wonderful."
