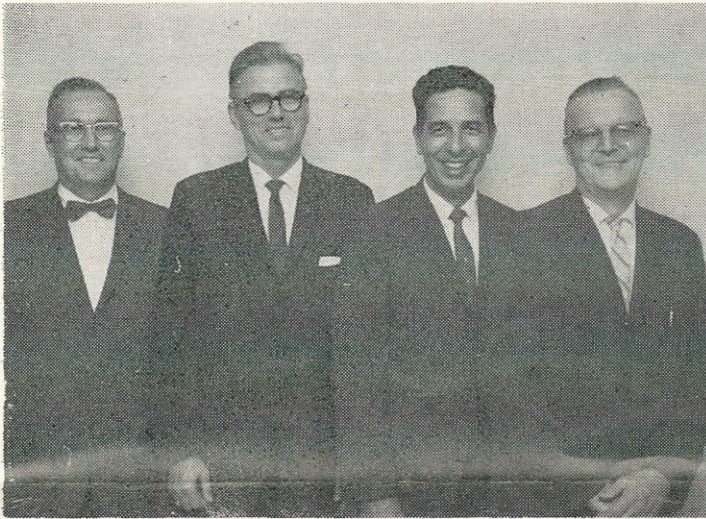

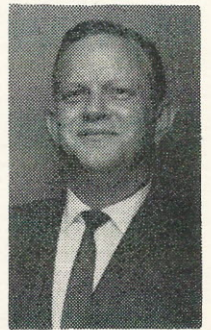
Challenge Accepted---Budget Adopted

The congregation of the First Baptist Church approved a record \$259,769 budget for 1963 last Sunday morning. J. Nixon Daniel, Jr., co-chairman of the Forward Program for 1963, stated after the budget adoption, "God has given us opportunities in this church equal to any in the South. We have a new educational building which gives us a capacity of 2100 people in Sunday School. Surely we will be faithful in our stewardship and accept the opportunities and challenges God has given us."



James L. Pleitz, Pastor, will preach a stewardship sermon at the morning worship service next Sunday.

A. H. Arnold, Budget Pledging Committee Chairman, has begun enlisting canvassers who will visit homes during the last week of the campaign. Arnold and his committee members will make sure every church member and Sunday School member has an opportunity to share in the work of the church during the coming year. There will be no pledging march in the sanctuary this year. Pledges will be turned in during the Sunday School hour and at church services on Pledge Day, October 28.

TITHING is a recognition of God's power.

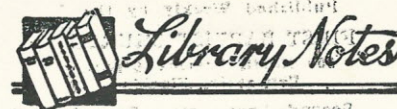
TITHING was required of the Jews, commanded by Christ.

NEW LIBRARY

You are invited to visit our new library located in the Annex Building. It is both beautiful and functional—one of which every member may be proud. There are two large display windows for the book library and one for the missions library. The shelving is adjustable. Special areas are provided for children's books, reference books, and general books for young people and adults, also magazines. A workroom with base and wall cabinets and sink is provided for repair work and storage. The visual aid material and equipment will also be kept in the workroom.

The purpose of the church library is to establish a book ministry and resource center to reinforce the entire religious education program of the church. Through this center of learning many lives can be changed, children may through books be led to a faith in Jesus; a Christian to a deeper spiritual life; a teacher to a better understanding of his work; and parents may be helped in teaching doctrines and church history to their children.

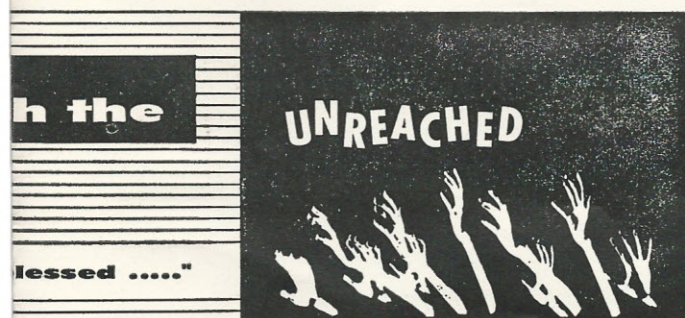
