REQUIREMENTS FOR DEACONS

- D — could stand for "DEDICATION." They would be men "full of the Holy Ghost" with convictions and without possibility of compromise. Dedication is the one big need of our churches today and for lack of it Christianity suffers.
- E — would call for "ENTHUSIASM." It spells zeal in being about Christ's mission. Enthusiasm takes the drudgery out of work. It takes the brakes off progress and it shoots the project into orbit to function so long as enthusiasm lasts.
- A — would introduce "AFFECTION" or, better still, the synonym of love which is a warmer word. Affection first to God, to be sure, and then an affection for people. It would be an affection which would draw the people into love for God.
- C — introduces "COURAGE." The churches are filled with people who know right from wrong, but few are the number willing to take their stand regardless of price. Silence in an hour of trial condones evil and has no place for men of courage.
- O — and "OBEDIENCE" comes into focus. It is obedience to God and all He commands. It is carrying out the wishes of the church as it projects its program. Obedience, in a peculiar way, is the ministering to others and all for the glory of God.
- N — would stand for "NAME," or as the Bible puts it, "men of honest report." All that has gone before adds into reputation or name. There can be no leadership without reputation.
- D-E-A-C-O-N. It is an elaboration of the New Testament teaching for "Men of honest report, full of the Holy Ghost and wisdom, whom ye may appoint over this business."

PROCEDURE FOR NOMINATING DEACONS

The Committee for the Nomination of Deacons requests that every member of the church suggest men who should be considered by the committee for nomination as deacons. You may suggest as many as you think qualify.

These suggestions must reach the committee by noon, Monday, July 29. They may be given to any member of the committee, mailed to the church office in care of the committee, or dropped in the offering plate. Suggestions are to be submitted only by members of the First Baptist Church, and therefore must be signed to be accepted.

Your committee, selected for the purpose of recommending to the church the best qualified persons, requests that you read the scripture passages below and suggest the names of as many men as you believe to be qualified to serve as deacons. According to the policy of the church, inactive deacons will not be placed on the ballot unless suggested by one or more members of the church.

SELECTION OF THE FIRST DEACONS

"In those days, as the number of disciples kept growing, there rose complaint on the part of the Greek-speaking Jews against the Hebrews because their widows were overlooked in the daily charities. So the twelve summoned the assembly of the disciples and said, 'It is not desirable that we should neglect the teaching of God's Word to wait tables; therefore, brothers, look around for seven men among you of good reputation and full of the Spirit and of wisdom, whom we shall appoint for this duty, while we continue to devote ourselves to prayer and the ministry of the word.' (Acts 6:1-4, Berkeley Version).

THE CHARACTER AND QUALIFICATIONS OF ALL DEACONS:

"By the same token are deacons to be honorable, not gossips, not addicted to much wine, not greedy for ill-gotten gains, but with a pure conscience keeping hold on the hidden truth of the faith. They should first be put on probation, and then, if irreproachable, they may serve as deacons. Similarly must the wives be honorable, not given to slandering, but temperate and altogether trustworthy. Deacons shall be husband of one wife, admirable manager of their children and of their own homes. Because those who rendered helpful service as deacons do take a worthwhile step upward for themselves with considerable conversational freedom in the faith that centers in Christ Jesus." (I Timothy 3:8-13, Berkeley Version).

We urge you to be much in prayer that we as a church may know God's will in this all-important task.

This ballot will be on Sunday morning, September 8, when ten men will be selected to serve on the active board of deacons for the three year term beginning October 1, 1963.

**DR. JOHN DRAKEFORD COMING
FOR CHRISTIAN HOME CONFERENCE
JULY 26-28**

A native of Sydney, Australia, Dr. Drakelford received the B. A. degree from the University in Sydney and did graduate work majoring in child guidance at the Sydney Teachers' College where he received a graduate diploma in education. He also graduated from the New South Wales Baptist Theological Seminary.

Dr. Drakelford held several pastorates in Australia and was for three years chaplain in the Australian army serving in the Pacific Islands. During this time he was chaplain for a year in the largest army psychiatric hospital in Australia.

He and his wife, the former Robina Bailie, who was born in Scotland and later moved to Australia, have two sons, Brenton and Warwick.

The Drakelfords moved to the United States in 1954 when he became identified with Southwestern Seminary. For three and a half years he served as pastor of the University Heights Baptist Church in Stillwater, Oklahoma. He has received the M.A. degree in psychology from Texas Christian University, the Th. M. degree in pastoral psychology from Brite College of the Bible and the Doctor of Religious Education degree with honors from the Southwestern Seminary. His doctoral thesis was written on "The Implications of Communism for Religious Education."

He now serves as Professor of Psychology and Counseling and director of the Baptist Marriage and Family Counseling Center at the Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary, Fort Worth, Texas.

A prolific writer and speaker, Dr. Drakelford has written *The Ego and I, Psychology in Search of a Soul, Counseling for Church Leaders* and was co-author of *An Introduction to Pastoral Counseling*. His latest book is *Red Blueprint for the World*. He is a regular speaker on the Southern Baptist Convention radio program "Master Control", and appears on a weekly TV panel "Planning for Tomorrow" on station WBAP, Fort Worth, Texas.
