

Last Sunday Morning, the congregation was called into a special business session for the purpose of adopting the 1964 Budget. The Chairman of the Deacons called upon Mr. J. Nixon Daniel, Jr., Chairman of the Finance Committee and General Chairman for The Forward Program. Mr. Daniel reviewed briefly the procedure which had been followed in preparing the Budget, and called attention to the major changes. The congregation had been given opportunity on the preceding Wednesday night to discuss freely all items in the proposed budget, and so there was no discussion on Sunday Morning.

Pastor's Paragraphs

THE CHRISTIAN RELIGION AND SOAP

Irving Hoffman, in a popular magazine, told about a little boy whose mind was centered on his parents' talk about our troubled world. The lad came to say his prayers. After praying for most everything and everybody he could think of, he concluded, "And please, God, take care of Yourself. If anything happened to You, we'd all be sunk."

Dr. Richard Brannon makes a thoughtful observation along this line worthy of our prayerful consideration: There is no question in the minds of thoughtful people that our world is in trouble. In fact, some of our foremost thinkers believe that it is in the most trouble that it has ever been in. When you begin to look at the predicament of modern man, you find yourself agreeing with the experts. Reflect for a moment upon some of America's problems: an immense and increasing crime rate; a rising number of problem drinkers and alcoholics; and the general breakdown of morals and the shocking number of divorces. Perhaps the increase of juvenile crime causes us more concern than any other single factor. The important thing to remember, however, is that all of this is occurring in a nation having a distinctive Christian heritage and claiming, at least, to be Christian now. Our country has more churches, more ministers, and more church members than any other nation in the world. It is a blatant contradiction that we should have so much to be ashamed of in the way of crime and moral decadence! The skeptic will be quick to point out that this contradiction proves that Christianity has failed. "Christianity has had its chance," declares the unbeliever. "It has had 1900 years to prove itself." My answer to this kind of logic is always the same, "Mister, have you tried Christianity?" Not even the best soap will get you clean if you never use it.



SUNDAY SCHOOL DEVELOPMENT COURSE

Without dedicated, trained lay leaders the total program of the church will not progress as it should. Hence, a special effort to train workers in different phases of Sunday School work will be started on November 3.

LENGTH OF COURSE:

The Course is designed to last six months — twenty-six weeks.

MEETINGS:

One class session will meet on Sunday morning during the Sunday School hour—beginning at 9:25 A.M.

Wednesday evening during the Officers' and Teachers' Meeting.

In addition to the weekly meetings, the Course is designed to include a monthly class meeting when class and department administration will be discussed.

ATTENDANCE:

A requirement of 18 of the 25 scheduled class session attendance will be made. When absent, regardless of the reason, it will be necessary to turn in the answers to the questions on the chapter or chapters assigned for that day.

No one enrolled in the Course shall substitute teach during the Course.

No one enrolled in the Course shall quit in the middle of the course to teach a class.

WHAT TO STUDY?

There will be five books on which credit will be received:

TEACHING TO WIN AND DEVELOP, Corzine

PREPARING TO TEACH THE BIBLE, Colson

THE BOOK OF BOOKS, Hester

THESE THINGS WE BELIEVE, Turner

In addition to these, each class member will be expected to study the departmental Administration book and the departmental Teaching book for the age-group with which he desires to work. Examinations will be given on the one in the phase of the work he wishes to serve—administration or teaching.

There will also be parallel reading for each member from books and materials relating to the course.
