WHO IS TONE DEAF?

Some people are unable to sing on key or carry a tune. This inability to sing musical notes on pitch is commonly called "tone deafness". To sing on key, the ear, brain, nervous system and larynx (voice box) all must function properly in co-ordination. If any of these functions is limited, the ability to sing on pitch can be hampered.

Little research has been done on musical tone deafness, and the cause and how frequently it occurs are not known. If it is caused by a hearing impairment due to loss of nerve function, little can be done to correct it. Mrs. Eleanor C. Ronnei, director of the New York League for the Hard of Hearing, says some people are not able to tell one sound from another, although they do hear a sound. These people are the true tone deaf and are unable to differentiate the pitch of various musical notes. Others can tell when a note is off pitch, but cannot sing on pitch themselves. In these cases, the inability to carry a tune can be due to lack of training or faulty transmission of the hearing stimulus through the nervous system. Hearing experts estimate, though, that most children can be trained to identify piano tones. Their ability to sing on pitch can be a matter of further training. Ruth M. Shafer, a music supervisor in the New York City school system, says almost all first-grade pupils without hearing impairment or vocal cord injury can be taught to sing on pitch if they are given daily, individual help.

Learning musical pitch should start early. W. Dixon Ward, Ph.D., of the department of otolaryngology at the University of Minnesota Medical School, says children should begin as early as possible to play the "find the note" game on the piano. In this game, the child stands with his back to the piano while the teacher or parent strikes a note. The child then turns around and tries to strike the same note.

A child can also be sung to and then be asked to repeat the song to develop singing on pitch. James G. Teegarden, Ph.D., associate director of the American Hearing Society, says it requires patience and time to train the child who sings off pitch. He and Dr. Ward caution against telling any child he is tone deaf because it may give him a psychological block against singing on pitch. The chances are, Dr. Teegarden says, the child is not really tone deaf and can be trained.

HYMNS ANNOUNCED . . . HYMNS UNANNOUNCED?

When perhaps every person (except a very limited number—children too young to read or adults who misplaced their reading glasses) can read the Order of Service which is provided for our worship services, we are asked why the duplication in announcing each hymn? We believe that the congregation possesses faculties to be able to read for themselves and that the service would be less distracted and interrupted if the organist was to give musical introductions to the hymns as she does the Doxology. The Order of Service would be a spiritual and logical progression of thought from the Call to Worship and Invocation to its climax—the Sermon and Invitation. It would be more of an experience of worship and less a program of activity divided among the leaders and those in the pews.

On September 6, at the morning worship we will begin following the Order of Service unannounced. We will make every effort to present God in His holiness, His continuous presence through His Holy Spirit. We will try to avoid doing anything which would take our minds and spirits from the Living Christ. Each person worships God as an individual. It is through corporate activity that we are moved to a more acceptable offering of self in worship.



SOME THINGS SOUTHERN BAPTISTS HAVE LEARNED

1. The best way for a church to grow numerically is through the Sunday School. 90 per cent of the people who have joined our churches have been reached first by the Sunday School.

2. The Sunday School can teach the Bible effectively if right methods are followed.

3. Adult church members not enrolled in Sunday School miss out on most of that which the church has to offer—especially personal attention.

4. An absent pupil, when not promptly contacted, gradually loses interest and eventually drops out completely.

5. People who drop out of Sunday School tend to drop out of other church activities as well.

6. The church can use the Sunday School to accomplish any task involving all the people.

7. Build a great Sunday School and nothing in the world can keep you from having a great church.
