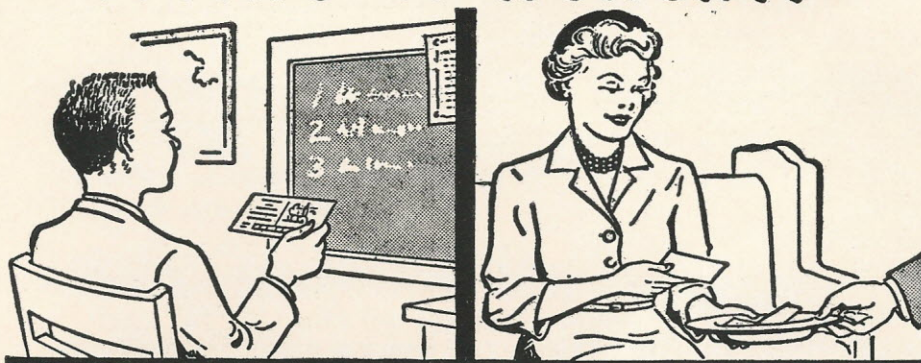
'65 BUDGET TO BE ADOPTED SUNDAY

=GIVING is WORSHIP=



The annual stewardship emphasis in our church will be officially begun with the adoption of our 1965 budget goal in the morning worship service on Sunday.

The Budget Planning Committee, headed by Glenn R. McDonald, prepared the budget after much study. Their recommended budget was submitted to the Finance Committee and the Deacons of the church. The recommended budget was mailed out in the Builder last week so that members of the congregation might study it prior to the official presentation to the congregation on Wednesday Evening, October 14th. At that time, opportunity was given for questions and discussion. On next Sunday morning at the 11:00 Service the congregation will be called upon to vote to adopt this budget for the year 1965.

The needs for each organization of the church were studied carefully during the preparation of the budget, as well as the church's part in World Missions. The recommended budget calls for an increase in the amount given to World Missions through the Cooperative Program.

The next three weeks will be given over largely for stewardship education and information. This is the time when we think about our giving program for the coming year, and it gives an excellent opportunity to study again what God's word teaches about the stewardship of material possessions. This twenty-nine day emphasis will have the general theme, "In Loving Obedience, We Give!"

We will be in error if we interpret this simply as a way to raise money for the church. The first objective is consecration and spiritual dedication of all of life. When this is accomplished it will be easier to reach our giving goals, too.

Church members are urged to tithe to meet the proposed budget. It is estimated that if every member tithed, the total income would be about double the proposed budget.

Our church will have a glorious jubilee ministry during 1965 when we consecrate ourselves and our money to the Lord's work.

Pastor's Paragraphs . . .

THE CHURCH BUDGET

You found the proposed budget for 1965 in last week's issue of our church bulletin. This proposed budget was prepared by dedicated men and women representing all areas of our church life.

This budget represents the program of work for our church for 1965. It represents the dedication and love of our membership for Christ and His church.

It represents the outreach and compassion of each individual. It represents you.

I suggest to you that THE BUDGET SPEAKS.

1. IT SPEAKS ABOUT PLANNING.

We plan to provide for our own—A large portion of this budget is to be spent on a more effective ministry for our own people. The ministry of music, education, visitation and preaching are provided for in this budget.

We plan to pay our debts—The budget includes a sizable amount for the payment of our indebtedness.

We plan to preach Christ from here to the ends of the earth.—We will increase our giving through the Cooperative Program—our world mission outreach. We will support associational missions. This we do in order to preach Christ throughout the world.

2. IT SPEAKS ABOUT PARTNERSHIP.

This budget is a partnership. We can do what none of us could do alone. I cannot build colleges, seminaries, hospitals, and send missionaries, but with the help of "partners" like you, I can do all of these things. Even our children can take part in such witnessing through a budget like this. Praise God for such a plan of partnership. Be a good partner!

3. IT SPEAKS ABOUT PURPOSE.

The Apostle Paul was moved by the Spirit of God to say, "Every man according as he purposeth in his heart, so let him give; not grudgingly, or of necessity; for God loveth a cheerful giver." (II Cor. 9:7).

All Christian giving should be "predetermined" giving. Predetermined giving, which is pledging to give, is indicative of real character. Purposeful giving indicates a prior claim, a prior commitment, and a supreme allegiance.

I want to challenge you to "take a step up" with me and my family in giving to Christ through next year's budget. Long ago we established the tithe as a minimum standard of giving. We have been enabled to "take a step up" several times since then. We intend to do so again next year. God has been good to us. Out of gratitude, we plan to do even more than in the past. Won't you join us?

ROUTH TO SPEAK AT LEADERSHIP BANQUET

We are most fortunate to have as our speaker for our Leadership Banquet Tuesday, October 20, Dr. Porter Routh, who is Executive Secretary-Treasurer, Southern Baptist Convention Executive Committee.

Dr. Routh was born in Lockhart, Texas, and was educated in the public schools of Dallas, El Paso, and Oklahoma City. He received his A.B. degree with honors from Oklahoma Baptist University in 1934 and has done graduate work at the University of Missouri, George Peabody College, and Southern Baptist Theological Seminary.

He served as Secretary of Brotherhood and Promotion for the Oklahoma Baptist Convention; as Editor of the Oklahoma Baptist Messenger; Secretary of Baptist Sunday School Board Department of Survey, Statistics, and Information before going to his present position in 1951.

He has appeared on national radio and TV programs and on programs of national, state, and associational meetings, in addition to frequent engagements in churches for various services. A regular contributor to many denominational publications, he is also author of *My World Too*, published in 1948; *Meet The Presidents*, published in 1953; and *77,000 Churches*, published in 1963.
