

Influence

"One thing stirs me when I look back at my youthful days, namely the fact that so many people gave me something or were something to me without knowing it. Such people, with whom I never perhaps exchanged a word, yes, and others about whom I merely heard things by report, had a decisive influence on me; they entered into my life and became powers within me. Much that I should otherwise not have felt so clearly or done so effectively was felt or done as it was, because I stand, as it were, under the sway of these people. Hence I always think that we all live, spiritually, by what others have given us in the significant hours of our life. These significant hours do not announce themselves as coming, but arrive unexpectedly. Nor do they make a great show of themselves; they pass almost unperceived. Often, indeed, their significance comes home to us first as we look back, just as the beauty of a piece of music or of a landscape often strikes us first in our recollection of it. Much that has become our own in gentleness, modesty, kindness, willingness to forgive, in veracity, loyalty, resignation under suffering, we owe to people in whom we have seen or experienced these virtues at work, sometimes in a great matter, sometimes in a small. A thought which had become act sprang into us like a spark and lighted a new flame within us . . .

Pastor's Paragraphs

AN EVALUATION

Just how do you go about evaluating the results of a revival. (Come to think of it, it's mighty hard to evaluate any ministry of a New Testament church.) Can the results of a revival be weighed or measured? Perhaps so. Perhaps not.

Judged on the basis of attendance the results are inconclusive. Although the crowds were good with the exception of one night, some of our members did not attend a single service of the revival.

Judged on the basis of additions, the results were much more conclusive. There were 28 additions to the church during the week. Most of these were professions of faith. In addition to these that joined there were at least 50 other meaningful decisions registered during our revival.

At this point the tangible evidence ends, but on the basis of mere tangible evidence no evaluation can be made of any revival. Oh that it were possible to evaluate what has taken place in the heart! I do not know what has taken place in your heart, but mine was strangely warmed by the revival. By the grace of God from now on I will follow my Lord with the allegiance of Ruth rather than the shallow devotion of Orpha. From now on I will do so with the assurance that God provides five stones, not just one!

Thank you, Thank you, Paul Stevens and James Burleson for coming our way.

On Sunday, May 9, we will have a service of Parental Dedication. The new babies born to members of our congregation and those unable to participate last year will be introduced to the people and a prayer of dedication will be offered.

The significance of this service is the dedication on the part of the parents. You remember the experience of Hannah, the mother of Samuel, who first having yielded her own will in dedication to God, dedicated her child to the glory of God.

Here is the procedure for the service:

1. Parents who plan to participate will go to the nursery following Sunday School and get their child, then will go to the dining hall area.
2. There will be a brief period of instruction and preparation and at the appropriate time, early in the service, the children will be taken to the sanctuary for the very brief service.
3. Then the parents will take their children back to the nursery and return themselves to the service in the sanctuary.
