God is at work in Africa. It thrills my soul to be a part of it. This has been the most fantastic experience of my life. As we drove down from Nyeri to Nairobi yesterday, Missionary Al Cummins told me that there may be a thousand and conversions as a result of the East Africa Revival Campaign. There have been hundreds of professions of faith already.

I preached three times yesterday. The last service was conducted late in the afternoon on a mountainside out from Nairobi.


The little church was about the size of the pastor's study in Pensacola. The floor was dirt, but then so were the walls. They "splurged" a bit on the roof. It was made of corrugated tin.

The African translator did an excellent job translating my sermon. I preached from the eighth chapter of Acts on the conversion of the African. When the invitation was extended, eight people came professing their faith in Jesus. You see, not only were the people there, God was there too!

One young man left the service in a hurry. In a few minutes he came back carrying a pineapple. He insisted that I accept it. It was his love gift for the preacher.

What's a pineapple worth in Pensacola? Here one like this sells for about a shilling — fourteen cents. His was a fourteen-cent offering. Pretty small? I have never received a greater one! His giving

called for sacrifice. It reminds me of the gift given by the widow in the Bible.

I thank God daily for a great church where people believe in missions. I thank God that next year we will make a substantial increase in our mission giving. Apart from our gifts there could be no Baptist work here in East Africa.

In the near future we will be making our budget pledges for the new year. How many pineapples will you give?

# Pastor's Paragraphs

## A MIRACLE ON A MOUNTAIN

It was cold on the mountain top. Although the African summer is approaching, it felt like early winter. My missionary host, James Hampton, told me the elevation was over 9,000 feet. The service at Oldonya Sambu had gone extremely well. Four people had come confessing Christ as Saviour. (Twenty-there made professions of faith in the morning service at Enkokidon-quoi. The total converts

for Kenya alone has gone over a thousand. At the present rate, over 1500 will be reached in the East African Crusade.

The service at Oldonya Sambu ended at 4:30. There was still time to make some visits in the homes. Since it was sprinkling rain, we decided to drive on up the mountain in the Land Rover. This is the only way to travel in this country.

The mountain was literally covered with African huts. The circular huts were perhaps 20 feet in diameter. There were no windows. There were no chimneys. When there is a fire inside, the smoke simply seeps through the roof. It looks like the hut is on fire. One is tempted to call the fire department, but then there is no fire department — but then neither is there a phone.

The home we visited was literally on top of the mountain. A sign warned of a kali (mean) dog, but he didn't bother us when we walked up the path to the hut.

The fire inside on the dirt floor felt good. Six of us completely circled it. There was a mother hen sitting in one corner with her little biddies. Three kittens were huddled together right at the edge of the open fire. Since it was not yet dark, the goats were still outside. They, too, would spend the night in the circular grass home.

Brother Hampton spoke in Swahili. The African pastor translated the message into Kikuyu. The man we were visiting listened intently. So did his wife who held their youngest child in her arms.

By this time some folk from the church came up the path. The little hut simply could not hold the crowd. We moved outside. Within ten minutes, 50 people arrived. They were all interested in what the missionary man read from God's Word.

We sat outside the hut for perhaps an hour. In an hour's time several babies were born into God's Kingdom, and at least one Baptist preacher forgot how cold it was on the mountain top . . .

The good Lord willing, I'll see you Sunday. My prayer is that God will give us a mountain-top experience.


## A SPECIAL NOTE ABOUT A GRADUATE
