If you are in that company of the timid, why not take a look around, then walk off and leave that crowd. Do something worthwhile. Fail a few times if you must. At least try.

Harold Heifer in the Kiwanis Magazine cites the classic example of Babe Ruth.

He struckout 1330 times, a record in futility unapproached by any other player in the history of baseball. But that isn't what we remember about Babe Ruth. His 714 home runs obliterated the 1330 strikeouts.

Cy Young, perhaps the best pitcher of all time, accumulated 511 victories, a mark that never has been threatened. But what is generally forgotten is that Young actually lost almost as many games as he won.

One of the failingest men who ever lived was always trying experiments that were unsuccessful. Yet we never think of Thomas Edison as a failure.

During the French and Indian War, at Fort Necessity, a young American officer capitulated to the enemy. But we never think of George Washington as the man who surrendered to the French.

People would feel a lot less sensitive about failure if they remembered it just doesn't matter, except as a guidepost for one's self. Success is a bright sun that obscures and makes ridiculously unimportant all the little shadowy flecks of failure.

Why not get busy now at something truly worthwhile for our Lord.
