Pastor's paragraphs

IT HAPPENED IN NEW ORLEANS

The 121st annual meeting of the Southern Baptist Convention is now history. At the New Orleans Convention, Southern Baptists reaffirmed our intention to



continue majoring on ministering to the spiritual needs of mankind. However, there were numerous indications that we are also becoming increasingly aware about the total needs of mankind. Dr. W. A. Criswell of Dallas, who was elected to a second term as President, said:

"Our ministry and message must be to the whole man. Half a religion is not enough. A whole man needs a whole religion. True Christianity involves both the body and the soul, the head and the heart, the inward and outward life.

"A theological dualism that separates the temporal from the eternal, the physical from the spiritual, the soul from the body, this world from the world to come, is alien to the mind of Christ."

Although James Foreman did not come to New Orleans, the Convention went on record as rejecting the demands of the Black Manifesto. The Manifesto used such terms as "the use of force," "the power of the gun," "to bring this government down." (Please remember this Manifesto does not represent the attitude of the vast majority of our negro friends any more than the Klu Klux Klan represents the attitude of the average white man.)

In New Orleans, the Convention voted "to encourage the Home Mission Board and other Southern Baptist Agencies to give prayerful urgency to continuing implementation of the suggestions made in the 'Statement Of Crisis' in the nation."

The Crisis Statement was adopted at the Houston Convention in 1968. A part of that Statement reads: "We will strive
