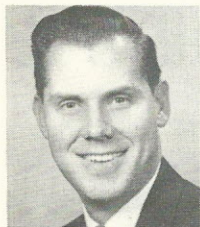

Pastor's Paragraphs

TAKE HEART, MADALYN

The crowd was disappointingly small. She had expected thousands but less than forty showed up for the convention in Austin, Texas.



There were probably more news reporters there than there were delegates to Madalyn Murray's Atheist Convention.

(If you see Madalyn, please tell her not to be disappointed in the attendance. Just because the

multitudes didn't come, she should not think for one minute that they are committed to Jesus Christ. On the contrary, the vast majority of Americans couldn't care less. According to the teachings of Jesus, these uncommitted multitudes can be counted in HER fold . . . Regardless of whether they attended the Convention or not.)

You'll have to travel many a mile to find a more optimistic crowd than the atheists that gathered in Austin last week. They calmly divided up the state of Texas and started planning to establish atheist churches in cities and communities all over the state. (Take note Texas Baptists. Forty committed atheists will give a million lukewarm Texas Baptists a hard row to hoe.)

Honestly, there are some features about atheism that are most appealing. For one thing it is not very demanding. You can do as you please and it's free! Even attendance at the Convention was not compulsory. Nor is it for the Christian. You don't HAVE to attend church, but if you don't WANT to, something is radically wrong in your heart.

"Top priority for Christians," said the late William Temple, Archbishop of Canterbury, "is the public worship of God; all else, including social action, is derivative." It is well to remember that Dr. Temple was one of Britain's most prominent progressives who believed that it is part of the religion of a man to see that his country is well governed.

God willing, we will meet to worship the Living Lord next Sunday. Will you testify to the validity of your belief in Goy by being present?

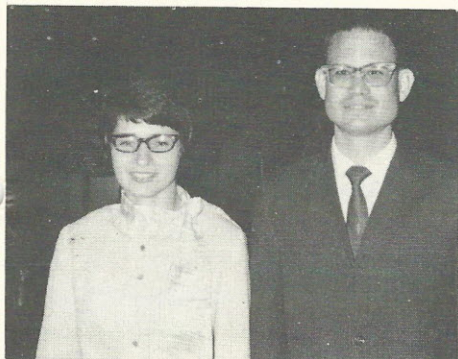
