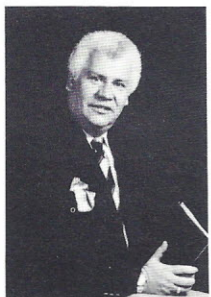

and no lottery! We must take issue sharply with those who would overrun Florida with big - time casinos and a big - time lottery. Both issues have the possibility of forever changing the face of favored Florida.

is likely an exercise in futility. I'm not sure we can change anyone's mind. What I am sure of is that you must say “NO” at the voting places.

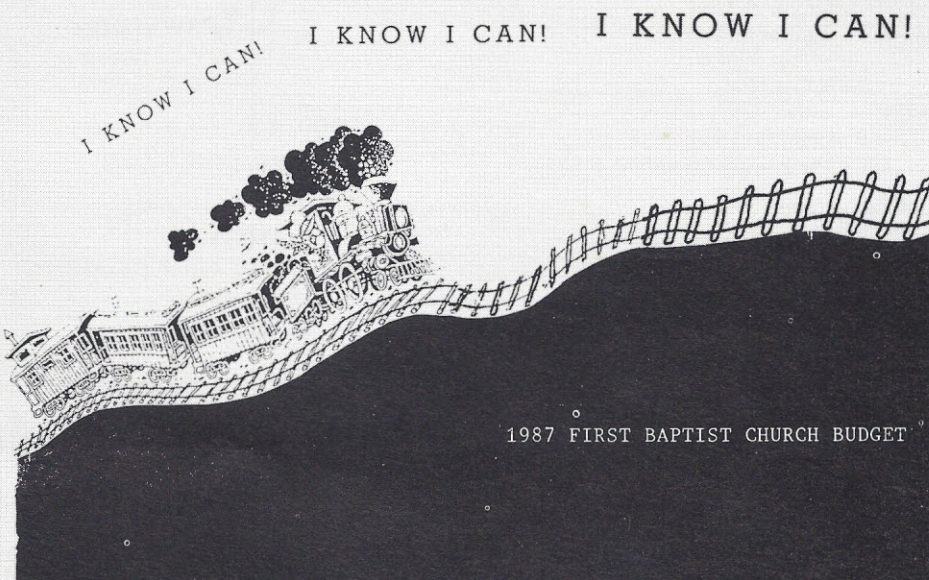

"To: Members of First Baptist

My Dear Friends:

What an exciting six months it has been with you. Of course, there have been many hours of loneliness and homesickness as I have been separated from my wife and home. God's love has been sufficient to see me through, along with the love and response which you have given to my ministry.

Together we have accomplished much of what we set out to do in coming to Pensacola. We made great strides in getting the Sunday School organization to see itself as a team for outreach and Bible study. A great city with thousands of lost and unreached people is waiting to see what First Baptist Church Pensacola is going to do about this challenge.

I must thank you from the bottom of my heart for your love and kindness. How attentive you were to Virginia, to my son, Ramsey, and me during the time of their surgeries and recovery. The flowers, get well notes and your many expressions of concern, but most of all your prayers, have drawn us very close to you. We thank God for the successful surgeries and the speedy recovery of both of my dear ones.

A short ministry, only a few months, but this has been one of the bright spots of my retirement career. Please be assured of my interest, concern and prayer for the First Baptist Church of Pensacola.

OUR FAMILY PRAYING

"And He (Jesus) spoke a parable unto them to this end, that *men ought always to pray, and not to lose heart.*" (Luke 18:1)

Repeatedly Jesus emphasized the power of prayer. The parable which follows Luke 18:1 deals with the need for persistence. He encourages us not to "lose heart." As long as we feel the nudge or urge to pray a certain way about a matter, we should continue to do so. If we are truly seeking God's will and guidance we will know when to let go of an unanswered petition / request. Until then, we have this parable in Luke 18:2-8 which certainly encourages persistence.

FLORIDA WILL BE THE LOSER!

How would you like it if the cost of law enforcement rose 194% in less than 10 years? What would you think about the cost of social services (welfare, H.R.S., etc.) soaring out of sight in a similar period of time? If you respond negatively to these questions you need to take a long hard look at the Casino/Lottery Amendments which go before the voters on November 4.

In a nutshell, gambling is bad for individuals, the State of Florida, and for businesses. In every state where gambling has been legalized there has been a negative effect on its populace.

The proponents of gambling make it look like a panacea for our state; but there is a price to pay for gambling. One — it falsifies the economy; Two — prices will escalate; Three — property values will zoom. If that isn't enough, consider the stress on social services. The operators of the gambling establishments are not going to pay to treat the compulsive gamblers, alcoholics, drug abusers, or criminals that gambling breeds — YOU ARE! *Think about it!*
