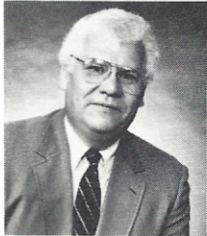
The Seagle Say:

This effort will be in addition to all we're currently doing in order to live up to the lofty claims of the "Friendly Family of First Baptist Church."

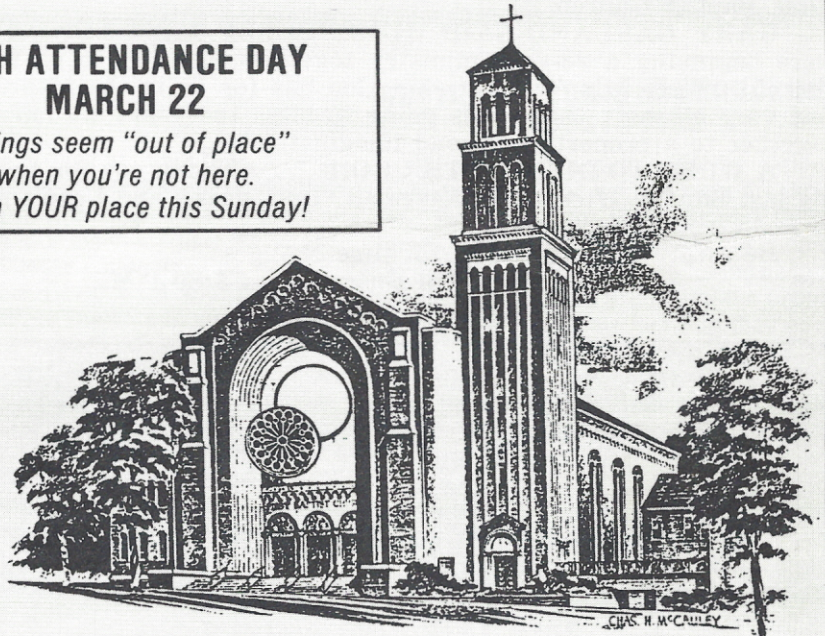
In my opinion it's a viable, visible and worthy ministry. Let's get going with it soon. Isn't it exciting?

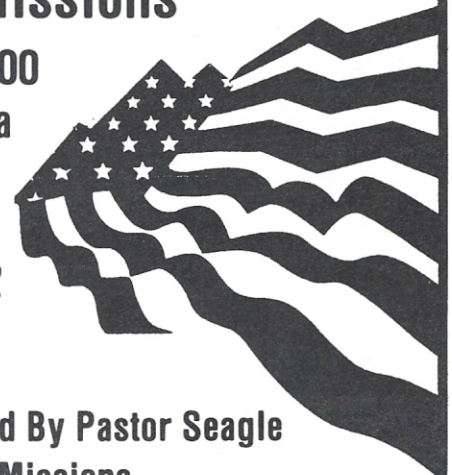

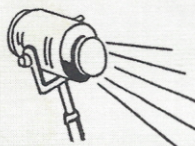

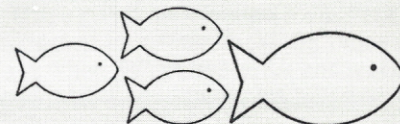

LANGUAGE STUDY

Mike Simoneaux said that David is too old to learn a language and so far he has not been proved wrong. However, despite all the pain of language study, things are really going well for us. We study four Lengua Espanola (Spanish Language Institute) and have several hours of homework and assignments in the community after that.

The classes are entirely in Spanish. Few of the teachers speak any English. Presently about 250 students are preparing for missionary work in Latin America, Spain, or Equatorial Guinea in Africa. About one-third of the students are Southern Baptist.

We have completed the first of three terms and are well into the second term. This promises to be our most difficult of the three terms. We must cover a tremendous amount of grammar in these fourteen weeks. Please continue to pray for our language learning. Our effectiveness as missionaries will be determined by the level of skill which we develop in Spanish.

HOW YOU CAN BE A MISSIONARY IN COSTA RICA

You probably already are participating in the work in Costa Rica. If you pray for us, give through the Lottie Moon Christmas Offering and regular church offerings, and write us of your prayers and support, you are a very big part of the work here. - 6) new opportunities for us to share the gospel
- 7) the unstable political situation in Ecuador.
- 8) our visa application process.

We are learning here that the love of Christ transcends all barriers. Almost from the day we arrived in Costa Rica, Melissa has had a number of one-on-one ministries go - with women she has met on the bus, in the park, and at school. Where words fail, the love of Jesus communicates.

In October David went with other language institute students to visit a Nicaraguan camp of 2300 refugees. They sang, preached, and in their halting Spanish, with tracts and Bibles, told them individually about Christ. This term David is coordinating a student ministry to a children's home near San Jose'.

The greatest proof that God can use our limited language abilities has come in the Tuesday evening Bible studies. When the leader quit, the participants asked David to teach. We are the only members of the group who speak any English, so our knowledge of Spanish is tested to its limit. We have marveled at the beautiful simplicity of the Gospel with a message simple enough that we can explain it even in our child-like Spanish.

ARE YOU REALLY GOING TO TAKE YOUR KIDS TO A THIRD WORLD COUNTRY?

Yes, and they love it. Kara and Blake are having a ball in Costa Rica. Of course, they miss their family and friends in the U.S., but here they have many friends among the missionary kids and the Costa Ricans. Both have been blessed with special Latin American friends right here on our block. They also have friends from several countries in their classes. The classes are in English but they also study Spanish in school.

Kara has become much in demand as a babysitter for the missionary families in the neighborhood. That and her activities with Acteens and the Southern Baptist youth group keep her calendar filled. Blake and his friends know every corner of El Bosque, our neighborhood.

The children, and their parents, enjoy occasional visits to an amusement park here in San Jose' and to the movies. Fortunately for us, most of the movies are the same ones showing in the States, spoken in English, but with Spanish subtitles. Well, maybe that is not so fortunate. We have the same problem as in the States of

finding a movie the whole family can go to see.

CULTURE SHOCK IS NOT SHOCKING IN COSTA RICA

We have not experienced the serious culture shock that we had been prepared for. This is due for the most part to the gracious spirit of the Costa Rican people. They are a gentle and peace-loving people. The country has no army, and the people are very proud of the fact that they have more teachers than policemen. They are friends of the U.S. and are very eager to help the nervous foreigner to find his way around their beautiful country.

Costa Rica is the perfect place for language study (if there can be a perfect place for so odious a task). The daytime temperatures are in the low to mid-seventies year round. There are only two seasons. The dry season runs from December through March or April and the rainy season fills up the rest of the year.

Most consumer goods available in the U.S. are also available here, though sometimes at a much greater price. The greatest adjustment for our family has been learning to live without cars. We wait sometimes for half an hour to ride crowded buses. At other times we walk long distances or hail a taxi. We have also learned to live in a smaller house and survive with no hot water in the house except in the shower. The Costa Ricans have no hot water. They take cold showers.

Many things are different for us here, but we feel at home here now. On those rare days when we get homesick and just cannot stand it any longer, we pay a visit to McDonald's or Pizza Hut.

PROFESSOR (MELISSA) CHISM

During our first month in Costa Rica, Melissa sat by a young college girl on the bus on our way to church. As is Melissa's custom, she tried to start a conversation and found that the young lady, Roxanne, is an English major at the University of Costa Rica. The conversation on the bus led to further conversations in our home and over the phone and the opportunity for Melissa to share her faith in Christ with Roxanne and one of her friends, also an English major. This friendship led to an invitation for Melissa to be guest speaker

in an English class at the University of Costa Rica and to share her faith with the entire class of English majors.

GUADALUPE BAPTIST CHURCH

The Chisms attend the Baptist church in Guadalupe, which is part of metropolitan San Jose'. One of the larger Baptist churches in Costa Rica, it averages about 160 in Sunday School. With two hours of Sunday School on Sunday morning, the first hour is dedicated to Bible teaching in the classes. The second hour is a time of worship and preaching for the adults in the church worship center. The pastor delivers a message during this time, but the service is under the direction of the Sunday School director. Worship is a bit more informal and relaxed in the Baptist churches in Costa Rica than in most U.S. Baptist churches. We often clap with the music as we sing and occasionally someone brings a tambourine.

We very much enjoy the warm fellowship and great spirit of this church. Please pray for our pastor, Gilbert Soto, a man with a heart for evangelism and missions.

WHAT DO YOU DO FOR FUN ON THAT LITTLE ISLAND

If you think that the Chisms are on an island somewhere the other side of Cuba, you have a whole host of company. It is natural to confuse San Jose', Costa Rica, with San Juan, Puerto Rico, but we live in Costa Rica, a country in Central America between Nicaragua and Panama. The government is a democracy, the purest that exists in any nation according to some experts.

The people are rightly proud of the natural beauty of their country. Our family has been able to enjoy a great deal of this beauty. We have taken three short trips to the Pacific beaches, a 2½ hour bus ride from San Jose'. The accommodations are nothing to write home about, so we won't.

We live in the Central Valley surrounded by beautiful mountains which are generally covered with either natural forests or coffee plantations. On one occasion we went with a church group to a park high up in the mountains. We barbecued meat over an open fire and drank coffee from beans grown in those very mountains and freshly ground.

We have also visited Poas, one of a number of active volcanoes in the country. We were able to walk to the very edge of the crater.

There is no lack of fun things to do in Costa Rica, just a lack of time in which to do them.
