The Seagle Say:

TWO SUNDAY . . .

Schools and Worship Services have provoked numerous calls for clarification. I want you to have all the information possible. The concept is not only sound, but exciting as well.

WHY WAIT 'TIL '88?

That's a good question. The answer is both logical and simple. Here goes with the answer . . .

— 1. Careful, prayerful planning is essential. That takes time.

— 2. An in-depth teacher-leader training process must be established. That takes time.

— 3. The music support must be worked out. That also takes time.

— 4. Every "nook and cranny" should be used in one before we go to two. That, too, takes some time.

My point? Let's prayerfully, carefully and cooperatively get set for the future.

WILL THE TIME . . .

for services change? No! The joy and strength of the process is that we do not need to alter our present schedule.

"WHEN WILL I . . .

be told which hour I go to Sunday School?"

The answer: you will *never* be told which hour; you may choose either hour. I can promise you that no one will be forced into an uncomfortable decision.

HOW DOES . . .

this idea work? It's so simple until it can be difficult. Let me explain:

— 9:00 A.M.: Sunday School as usual. The unusual will be a worship service in the Sanctuary while we have Sunday School.

— 10:10 A.M.: Both Worship and Sunday School will be dismissed. All in Sunday School will come to the Sanctuary, all in the Sanctuary will go to Sunday School.

— 10:30 A.M.: Worship as usual. The unusual will be the second Sunday School.

— 11:40 A.M.: Both Worship and Sunday School will be dismissed.

More simply stated, we will add one Worship Service at 9:00 A.M. and one Sunday School at 10:30 A.M.

WHAT ARE . . .

the advantages? There are several:

— 1. We have room to double our Sunday School and Worship attendance without spending more money on buildings;

— 2. We have the possibility of providing better space for those areas that desperately need additional gathering room;
