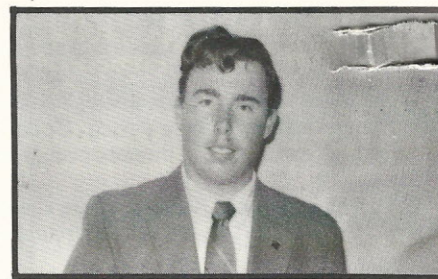

A NEW EVANGELIST FOR A NEW GENERATION.

Picture him standing tall, his left hand holding an open Bible, his right hand pointing upward. He is speaking to thousands crowded into a large arena. Picture him in the hostile environment of an inner-city high school. His pungent message keeps the attention of even the most troublesome teenager. Picture him talking with a distraught young man. Patiently, he gives the desperate man sound, biblical counsel. Picture him in a book-lined study. He has been there for hours, painstakingly researching and writing. Each of these images fits the same man. Dynamic and determined, he is considered by many to be a leading evangelist of today's generation. Jay Strack is his name.

Though in his early 30's, Jay reflects a wisdom far exceeding his years. His ministry has grown phenomenally and now touches thousands of lives every week. But life hasn't always been so fruitful for Jay. In fact, not too many years ago he was in serious shape.

GOING FAST DOWN THE WRONG ROAD

When Jay Strack was six years old his parents divorced, leaving him emotionally devastated. Jay and an older stepbrother stayed with their mother, moving from city to city within the scope of a few years. It was a difficult time in every sense-financially, socially, spiritually. Jay became disinterested in school, failing many classes and intentionally rejecting authority figures.

The situation worsened as Jay entered the teenage years. He began to drink, smoke and experiment with drugs. By the end of the seventh grade he was a "weekend drunk," as he puts it. By the eighth grade, he regularly smoked marijuana. Throughout high school, Jay was a typical "junkie." Life's misery was compounded when he was arrested for possession of drugs with the intent to distribute.

In the detention center, Jay recalls, "I had time to think. I realized I was going nowhere fast. I knew I had to change. Like most druggies, I had tried to quit a hundred times. I had even sworn to it over the grave of one of my friends who drowned while under the influence of drugs. But I never had the power."

A TROPHY OF GOD'S GRACE

As an infant, Jay had been baptized into the Episcopal Church, but he attended serices only on an occasional Christmas or Easter. Turned off to traditional religion, Jay toyed with Zen Buddhism and other cults. He found no satisfaction, of course, and felt more estranged from God than ever. At that critical time, a friend shared with Jay the same great news - news of true transformation, true spiritual power. The friend told of his own decision to become a Christian, and he invited Jay to attend a Bible study with a small group. It was there in the living room of his friend's home that a long-haired, barefoot, unkempt Jay Strack trusted in Jesus Christ.

Instantaneously, the blinders were removed and Jay understood the spiritual reality of salvation. Set free in his heart, he got rid of all the booze and drugs and paraphernalia. In place of the artificial "highs" he was used to inducing, Jay began to experience the thrill of growth in God's grace. His new life was vivid testimony that he was a trophy of that grace.

FIRST STEPS, FIRST FRUITS

Returning to school, Jay boldly shared his new-found faith. With zealous abandon he challenged scores of friends and acquaintances to give their lives to Christ. God began to bless his spontaneous evangelistic outreach with much fruit, creating a "Jesus Movement" type of following. He organized a nightly Bible study which soon attracted throngs of teenagers. In a matter of months, hundreds had believed and received Christ.

During those "Jesus Movement days" as Jay calls them, he met his wife, Diane. That was a high point. There were so many other blessings, and many lessons in those days. The most enduring, says Jay, is the conviction that "no lasting work for the Lord is done apart from the local church."

In the summer after his graduation from high school, Jay sensed the call of God to full-time ministry. He enrolled in a Bible study course taught by Dr. Fred Williams, director of Missions for the local Baptist Association. Thus began his formal preparation. A year later, Jay was called to pastor a small church in Immokalee, Florida. Everything seemed to be happening all at once. Jay comments, "I turned 19 years old on July 24, got my license to preach on August 15, got married on August 19, and went immediately to pastor."

After a year and a half in that rural pastorate, Jay knew he needed more education. He applied to numerous colleges, but was repeatedly turned down because of his police record and poor high school grades. Finally, Baptist College in Charleston, South Carolina accepted him on academic probation. Seizing the opportunity, Jay set out to prove his potential. He completed the college's four-year program in two years and graduated with honors.

AN EVER-WIDENING CIRCLE

During his days in Charleston, Jay preached in revivals throughout the Southeast, leading hundreds to a saving knowledge of Christ. Wanting to further advance his studies, he enrolled in the Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary in Fort Worth, Texas. But the invitations to preach soon became so numerous that Jay had to decide between them and seminary. Convinced that God was leading him, Jay launched into an evangelistic ministry.

Everywhere he went, God blessed his no-nonsense, direct preaching of the Word. In some cities, hundreds of decisions for Christ were recorded. Other opportunities opened up, including book, movie and recording projects. And, somehow, Jay found the time to complete courses of study in which he earned both master's and doctoral degrees through off-campus programs.

GETTING A PASTOR'S HEART

Feeling the increasing burden to "settle down" and spend time with his wife and two daughters, Jay accepted the call of the Riverside Baptist Church in Fort Myers, Florida. Under his leadership, the church grew explosively, its membership doubling to more than 3,000. More than 1,200 new believers were baptized. The church's outreach extended to include a radio station and a television ministry.

THERE'S THAT CALL, AGAIN

As much as Jay loved the people at Riverside and praised God for the fruitful ministry among them, his heart ached. The call to evangelism could not be denied. It was there, and Jay knew it was from God. He made the difficult decision to resign from the pastorate and answer God's call to evangelistic work. Since that crucial commitment, the burden has deepened, the vision has broadened, and the opportunities have increased dramatically.

Every year Jay's schedule includes nearly 30 week-long crusades, plus many one-night engagements. And there can be no doubt he is making an impact. Whether addressing a civic club, answering a pointed question on a television interview, or speaking to thousands in one of the rallies, Jay Strack is always the same. Dynamic. Determined. And dedicated to win others to the Savior.
