

ON THE BAY, ON THE HILL: THE STORY OF THE FIRST BAPTIST CHURCH OF PENSACOLA, FLORIDA.

By Toni Moore Clevenger. Edited by Martha Pope Trotter.
Pensacola: First Baptist Church, 1986. 337 pp.

As curator and secretary-treasurer of the Florida Baptist Historical Society, this reviewer has encouraged local churches for many years to write their histories. Fortunately, the number of histories produced has increased rapidly in the last few years. This history of the First Baptist Church of Pensacola has been a long time in brewing, but the end result is worth the waiting. As is the case with many good histories, this one resulted from the efforts of many people, and credit is given to a great variety of persons for their contributions. Special credit should go to the present history committee, in general, and to Toni Moore Clevenger and Martha Pope Trotter, in particular, for bringing this history to life. It is an excellent piece of work. Those who would learn about early Baptist life in West Florida and those who are interested in writing a history of their own church would profit from reading this book.

In addition, non-Baptists interested in learning about the history of early West Florida will find it to be a gold mine of information.

The history is beautifully illustrated from cover to cover. The dust jacket design depicts baptismal services being conducted in Pensacola Bay, thus making the title of the book come alive immediately. In the text itself the photographs, the chapter titles, and the section headings help to make the church of the past come alive. The photographs are well arranged at appropriate places throughout the book, and with the lucid writing reflected in the narrative, the result is a vivid history.

The writing contains several special features. First, the author weaves the story of the beginnings of the church and the early town of Pensacola together into a most remarkable historical tapestry. Second, the biographical presentation of a long list of distinguished pastors shows the importance of leadership to the life of the church. Third, the unique contribution of pastoral and lay leadership to the life of the growing city and the growth of the Florida Baptist Convention relates the life of the church to the larger picture. Fourth, the problems and the controversies that have been part of the history of the church are reported with candor, skill, and tact, which is not always an easy combination to achieve. Fifth, the appendixes and the excellent index contribute important additions which are often absent from church histories.

Although not as thoroughly documented with endnotes as it could be, the work is quite adequately documented. The resulting efforts of Toni, Martha, their committee and others is an excellent history, and a model others would do well to emulate. The church, the authors, and the editor are to be congratulated. Florida Baptists and church historians everywhere owe them a debt of gratitude. — E.
